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



BOOKING & PACKING

BOOK EARLY FOR FLIGHTS, FERRIES AND ROOMS

Make the most of your visit by planning thoroughly, particularly if you're visiting during the busy summer season. Here are some helpful tips.

- Book transportation well in advance. Seats on Alaska Airlines and Delta, and vehicle spaces on Alaska Marine Highway vessels, fill fast for the peak visitor season of May through September.
- Lock in lodging early and talk to your host or reservation service about local transportation.

PACK FOR EASYGOING COMFORT IN A MARITIME CLIME

While you're in Ketchikan, do as Ketchikan folks do: match your clothes to your activities. And if we have anything up here, it's activities!

- Pack lightweight shirts you can layer under sweaters and jackets. Light wool and polyester fleece outerwear are good to have along for our seaside conditions.
- Casual pants are welcome anywhere. On warm days a pair of shorts will feel right. But pack for what we call the temperate rain forest; we recommend a water-resistant coat with a hood and a pair of sturdy, waterproof shoes.
- Lightweight gloves and rain gear may be needed for hikes and saltwater excursions. Sunglasses and sunscreen are recommended for our long summer days, especially if you'll be on the water.
- If you're prone to motion sickness, see a physician before your trip.

FROM THE AIRPORT TO THE CITY

Ketchikan International Airport on Gravina Island is five minutes by ferry from town.

- Ferries depart *from the airport* on the hour and half-hour; ferries depart from the city *to the airport* 15 and 45 minutes after the hour. The adult fare is \$6; one-way fare for a standard car is \$7. Cash and credit cards are accepted. Free baggage carts are available.
- Rental cars can be picked up from rental agencies at Ketchikan International Airport or at the agencies' offices in town.

GETTING AROUND ON LAND

Taxis meet arriving airport and state ferries. Rates are \$3.70 a drop and \$3.30 per mile. Typical one-way fare downtown from the airport ferry landing is about \$13; downtown from the state ferry terminal, about \$12.

Ride-sharing programs such as Lyft are available.

Municipal bus service runs daily in the city and to rural areas south and north of the city. Service is hourly except on Sunday.

- Bus fare is \$2 for adults;\$1 for youths 12-17; and \$.50 for children 11 and younger (who ride free when accompanied by adults). A day pass is \$5 for adults and \$2.50 for youths 17 and younger.
- A free downtown shuttle bus runs May through September.

Public parking lots have time restrictions or require permits. One-day parking permits are \$5 at City Hall on Front Street.



CAMPING AND R.V. FACILITIES

Ward Lake Recreation Area's three campgrounds have 47 sites: some accommodate vehicles to 45 feet and most handle 30- to 36-footers. Reserve at U.S. Forest Service.

Settlers Cove State Park has 14 campsites and a cabin on the sea 18 miles north. Thirteen campsites accommodate RVs. Campsites are first-come, first-served; the cabin is available by reservation.

Clover Pass Resort has private RV facilities with hookups. Reservations well in advance are recommended. Walmart allows free overnight RV parking, limited to one day.

Remote cabin rentals are offered by the U.S. Forest Service and Alaska State Parks. Cabins have bunks, tables and stoves that burn wood or oil. Transport is by charter boat or aircraft.

If you bring a camper, book space early on the Alaska Marine Highway; car decks fill months in advance.

CAN'T-MISS ATTRACTIONS

NATURAL HISTORY. SCENIC GRANDEUR. DIVERSE CULTURES. THEY INSPIRE ONE-OF-A-KIND ATTRACTIONS IN KETCHIKAN

A

Creek Street borders Ketchikan Creek, where salmon runs attracted Alaska Natives for centuries and salmon still brave the falls in season. Brothels lined the creek from 1903 to 1953. Shops, restaurants, museums and galleries now welcome visitors to a distinctive neighborhood on the National Register of Historic Places. Creek Street lies between two other areas with federal recognition. Stedman Thomas National Historic District extends from the bridge to the south and includes sites beside Thomas Basin boat harbor. Our central commercial area was newly designated as the Downtown National Historic District in late 2017.

Southeast Alaska Discovery Center is an outstanding federal interpretive facility spotlighting the land, natural history and the people of Tongass National Forest.

Tongass Historical Museum proudly profiles our community's extraordinary past. The museum's exhibition and presentation areas were completely redesigned during the museum's half-century celebration in 2017. A new permanent exhibit debuts in spring 2018. **Dolly's House** down the creek preserves remnants of the red-light district.


At **Great Alaskan Lumberjack Show**, athletes show off skills used by those who work in the woods.



Totem poles bring global fame to Ketchikan and Saxman; this community is the proud home of the world's largest collection.

Poles stand in numbers in **Saxman Native Village** south of town, and in **Totem Bight State Park** and **Potlatch Park** out north. Poles are also seen in many public areas throughout the community—as well as at a few private residences where commissioned poles stand in view.

Ancient poles are preserved at **Totem Heritage Center**, a site on the National Register of Historic Places.

DAYBOOK CAN'T-MISS ATTRACTIONS

Two zipline attractions generate excitement with our mountains and tall trees—and one cable-borne adventure even finishes with a zing over the sea.

ITINERARIES FOR ACTIVE INTERESTS ... HAVE AS MUCH FUN AS YOU KETCHI-KAN

HISTORY HIGHLIGHTS

Day 1: Pick up a Historic Walking Tour Map at the Visitor Center and go for a walk! Stroll along historic Creek Street, then visit the Tongass Historical Museum. A stop at the Totem Heritage Center will give you a glimpse into the living artistic traditions of the Tlingit, Haida and Tsimshian peoples.



Day 2: Take a short trip out of town to view totem poles! Head south to Saxman Native Village or north to Totem Bight State Historical Park Talk to carvers, see Alaska Native dancers perform and learn about the rich traditions of our area's first peoples.

Day 3: Visit the Southeast Alaska Discovery Center and explore interactive displays about the ecology, economy and culture of Southeast Alaska and its temperate rain forest ecosystems. Then head out and explore the island, making sure to look for the Our Fishing Lifestyle interpretive signs (marked on the centerfold map).

Priceless artistry in cedar and spruce is displayed at Totem Heritage Center, an essential interpretive destination for visitors. The center is also an educational facility where talented artists and artisans teach traditional Northwest Coast design, toolmaking, carving and weaving.

SOMETHING FISHY

Day 1: Book a guided fishing charter and fish for salmon, halibut and cod. You may even be able to drop a few crab pots! And don't worry, most charters will process your catch and ship it to your home.

Day 2: Tour a former salmon cannery and look back at the industry that put Ketchikan on the map in the early 1900s as the "Salmon Capital of the World." Then head over to our salmon hatchery and see fish climbing against the current on their biological journey. You can even feed the growing salmon fry!

Day 3: Choose from our wide range of boat tour options and see beautiful natural scenery, wildlife and downtown Ketchikan from a different perspective. Or opt for a rental and explore on your own in a kayak, skiff or even a Zodiac

ACTIVE ADVENTURE

Day 1: Start off with a zip! Get a beautiful view of our islands as you soar through the trees on a zipline. Then go for a paddle; take a kayak tour to get close to marine life.

Day 2: Go on a hike! Ketchikan offers hikes of all lengths and difficulty. Make sure to pick up a free personal locator beacon and maps at the Visitor Information Centers.

Day 3: You're in the driver's seat on this tour! You can take the wheel of a Jeep, an ATV cart or even an inflatable speed boat.

Day 2: Stop by the Visitor Information Center and find out where to view wildlife. Bears are seen in late summer, eagles and marine life year-round, whales much of the summer.

Day 3: Get out of town! Ketchikan's main road, which stretches 30 miles from the epicenter of downtown. is a beautiful drive with lots of things to see and do along the way. Take a hike around Ward Lake. Beachcomb or picnic at one of our many beaches or state parks.

NATURE & WILDLIFE

THE RAINFOREST AND OCEAN GENERATE AMAZING LIFE, FROM TOWERING TREES TO GREAT WHALES



We share our forested lands and the surrounding ocean with a compelling array of wildlife. The temperate rainforest is not only one of the most beautiful places on earth, it's also one of the most biologically productive areas. Use the map in this guide to find trails that will put you right in the middle of our unique environment. Make a plan, collect appropriate clothing and gear, and get out there!

 More than 250 species of birds have been identified around the Ketchikan area. The Alaska Hummingbird Festival in April celebrates the springtime return of migratory birds.



- Migrating humpback whales and orcas (also known as killer whales), sea lions, seals and Dall porpoises are often spotted on cruise excursions.
- Sitka black-tailed deer inhabit the beaches and forest.
 Mountain goats and wolves can be seen at higher elevations.
- Black bears are commonly seen as they fish in streams for returning salmon; they also browse forested lands for berries and other edible plants.

Bald eagles roost high in the tree canopy when they're not hunting above the forest or sea. Guides on excursions will point out these sturdy nests on your route. Humpback whales such as those on this page rise dramatically out of the sea as they swallow their prey often near homes and roads.

MISTY FJORDS & TONGASS NATIONAL FOREST

Visits to Misty Fjords by air bring magnificent vistas into view, as seen on the opposite page. Many flights land on lakes or on salt water in the monument.

The rainforest is accessible on trails maintained by the U.S. Forest Service and Alaska State Parks


> Day cruises and flightseeing trips are offered daily during the summer season. Kayak companies and charter boats offer guided overnight trips.

- U.S. Forest Service maintains wilderness cabins in the monument for visitors who want extended visits.
- Petroglyphs—ancient rock art are etched into cliff walls in the monument. New Eddystone Rock, a volcanic core (seen below), towers above an island at the southern sea boundary of

the wilderness.

 Allow four hours for a cruise, two hours for flightseeing.

KETCHIKAN IS THE GATEWAY TO A ROCK SHOW LIKE NONE YOU'VE SEEN

Misty Fjords National Monument's deep mountain valleys and ocean inlets were carved by glaciers thousands of years ago. Some people call this granite grandeur the Yosemite of the North. Misty Fjords provides outstanding recreational opportunities and wildlife habitats. The wilderness is accessible by floatplane or boat from Ketchikan. The near edge of the 2.3 million-acre area is only 40 miles south of Ketchikan.

The world's largest collection of totem poles is found in Ketchikan and you can meet the artists and teachers whose work keeps the Native culture vital. The heritage of Northwest Coast tribes is integral here. Nearly 20 of every 100 residents of Ketchikan can trace some of their heritage to the Tlingit, Haida and Tsimshian tribes of Alaska.



Totem poles relate mythologies, lineages and tributes. Local guides can help visitors get the most from these towering narratives in totem parks. Other Northwest Coast art forms are grounded in utilitarian objects. Watch for intricately woven baskets; the example here was created by Delores Churchill, a renowned artist, teacher and recipient of a National Heritage Fellowship. Bentwood boxes in planks of local cedar, carved and painted, are also mainstays in galleries.




• Saxman Native Village and **Totem Bight State Historical**

Park display poles and clan houses. The parks also feature performances by Native dancers. Saxman's Totem Row Park offers the unique experience of seeing many of the world's finest examples of Alaska Native carving in a living, breathing Alaska Native community.

- Carvers at Saxman Native Village and Alaska Rainforest Sanctuary work on new totem poles and invite you to observe.
- Totem Heritage Center preserves ancient poles retrieved from abandoned villages. The center also instructs in traditional Northwest Coast design and art.
- Southeast Alaska Discovery **Center** features a replica of a summer fish camp and depicts traditional Alaska Native life.
- You can also visit a replica Native village, take a ride in a Nativestyle canoe or go with a walking tour to learn about Native culture and traditions.
- Tongass Historical Museum displays ancient tools and implements.

Ketchikan stands out in the Pacific Northwest and Alaska for the number of our artists and performers and the vitality of our arts scene. Public art abounds, from Alaska Native carving to commissioned contemporary pieces. See artwork in our galleries and shops. Immerse yourself in festivals, museums and special events. Check in with our Visitor Centers to discover what's happening on our cultural calendar during your visit.

- Celebrate internationally known Native artists working in traditional forms from carving to weaving. Contemporary artists produce amazing work in media from acrylic to sculpture, from ceramics to watercolor.
- Browse the community's diverse art galleries, many owned and operated by resident artists.
- Art exhibits, festivals and special events occur throughout the year. The highlight of summer is the **Blueberry Arts Festival** on the first weekend of August, with a dazzling array of artwork and public events. In the winter, residents work with visiting professional musicians to put on the Jazz and Cabaret Festival. Our several-night Wearable Art Show is the original, born in the 1980s. Our dance school offers seasonal public performances.



- Ketchikan's theater company produces a full season of stage entertainment. Concerts featuring our community band and community chorus also keep performing arts at the forefront.
- Our community's artists speak compellingly about this milieu







Human-powered sightseeing includes bike treks as well as guided kayak and canoe excursions—even one with Native language instruction. You can pedal a prop-driven, two-seat catamaran.

A converted Bering Sea crab boat takes visitors to see the thrills and skills of highseas fishing. Another boat tour visits a remote inlet for sightseeing and crabbing. Amphibious vehicles offer the best of both worlds, touring historic land sites before splashing into the ocean for a harbor cruise.

Glide through the rain forest's tall conifers with Ketchikan's zipline adventures, or take a ropes challenge course for another sort of thrill.

Take off in a fast inflatable boat for a guided tour of our islands.

Venture out to a remote lake by floatplane, or to an island by boat, and hike the rain forest. Or hike one of many nature trails that are just minutes from the city.



Our saltwater fishing is some of the best in Alaska. Five species of wild Pacific salmon return to native waters in this area: kings (or chinooks), cohos (silvers), sockeyes (reds), pinks (humpies) and chums (dogs).

Halibut such as the lunker above and red snapper offer great angling. Our cold, clean sea is rich with shrimp and crabs. Pristine freshwater lakes and streams hold trout, Dolly Varden and steelhead.

There are many options for fishing adventures. Full-service lodges and

resorts offer unforgettable outdoor adventure, great meals and comfortable lodging. Experienced guides provide halfday and full-day charters.

Do-it-yourself saltwater fishers can rent boats and gear. Floatplane pilots take anglers to remote lakes, some with cabins. Professional guides offer expert advice for your trip. Some fishing spots are accessible from our road system; others are reached by floatplane or boat.



PRINCE OF WALES ISLAND

The third-largest island in the United States (often called "POW" locally) is home to several thousand residents in communities of 50 to 1,500. The island is a prime destination for sportfishers and has outstanding opportunities for camping, hunting and hiking—linked by the longest road network in Southeast Alaska. Several roads are designated as

Alaska Scenic Byways.

Inter-Island Ferry Authority (IFA) provides daily passenger and vehicle service on a three-hour trip from Ketchikan to Hollis on the east side of POW. Local air carriers connect to the island on daily schedules; flight times range from 20 to 80 minutes, depending on your destination.

Remarkable totem pole parks stand in Klawock and Hydaburg. The Village of

Kasaan is a historic community of the Kaigani Haida. Visit Náay Í'waans (Chief Son-i-Hat Whale House) and Kasaan Totems Historic District.

During the summer, the U.S. Forest Service conducts guided tours of El Capitan Cave, the largest of 500 on the island. Register online or at ranger districts.

Visitors and residents run 26 miles of scenic roads on Memorial Day weekend in the Prince of Wales Island Marathon, a sanctioned race that also features halfmarathon and relay competitions.

By the Sea Arts and Seafood Fest in Coffman Cove the second weekend in August is a highlight of summer for residents and visitors.

Consider extending your SOUTHEAST visit to get acquainted with communities across our region. Every community has distinctive features worth sampling.

- Prince Rupert, British Columbia, is our closest Canadian neighbor. Travel time is six hours on Alaska Marine Highway ferries or 45 minutes by air.
- Hyder is on the Alaska side of the international border near Stewart B.C. Bear viewing and glaciers are highlights of the area. Access is from B.C. Highway 37. Six hours by ferry to Prince Rupert plus four hours by highway, or 55 minutes by air.



- Metlakatla Indian Community was founded in the 1880s by Tsimshians from British Columbia. Annette Islands Reserve is the only federally recognized Native reservation in Alaska. 45 minutes by ferry plus a 20-minute drive, or 15 minutes by air.
- Wrangell is the gateway to the Stikine River and Anan Creek Bear Observatory. Petroglyph Beach has ancient Alaska Native artistry in stone. Six hours by ferry or 45 minutes by air.
- Petersburg, Alaska's "Little Norway," was settled by Norwegian fishermen. Scandinavian tole paintings grace many buildings. Nearby LeConte Glacier is a major attraction. Ten hours by ferry or 55 minutes by air.

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
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
